and finally a perfect home awaiting the fish. Soon we will be stocking the pond. This will offer the ideal setting for a tool to explore, monitor and experience our native Pennsylvanian fish. We plan to incorporate this tool into the museum's education programs, as well as, the WWM Scout Merit Badge Program.

The effects... There is a noticeable change in the environment and politics that surround the area of the Bristol Bay in Alaska. Although the environment may produce unseasonably warm weather, a lesser amount of salmon and even a few minor physical terrain changes on the Nushagak...the most noticeable changes are solely manmade. Due to an astronomical amount of commercial fishing there was an obvious change in the salmon of the river this season. The most disturbing evidence of this, aside from the lesser fish count, was the scarring and altered appearance of most of the fish caught by the sports fishermen. Some fish we caught were missing portions of their mouths, eyes, etc.. This

plentiful in the Bristol Bay that from the air they resembled the tight and closely knit boxes of a crossword puzzle. The times that these nets were permitted in the water were often changed to benefit the commercial fishing with extensions of hours to days. It was frustrating each morning as we would listen to NPR (National Public Radio) at the start of each day hoping that it would be the day the nets would be lifted to allow the salmon to return to their runs up river.
